

## My work...

... fascinated by architecture and interior design, I began working in drawing and oil painting, then discovered stained glass through an evening class, joined another two week course in casting glass, and I was hooked on glass! The course at Central St Martins School of Art allowed me to experiment further with fusing and printing on glass, painting with enamels, creating different textures with acid and sandblasting, so many different techniques which showed me many further possibilities. Some interesting commissions in London and France gave me a lot of freedom in my work, allowing me to use all the skills I developed on the course.

# Currently...

... back in France after 12 years in England, and now working in textile, making rugs. I'm working in a similar scale although with a very different material, which also offers surprising possibilities in terms of design, colours, and textures.
